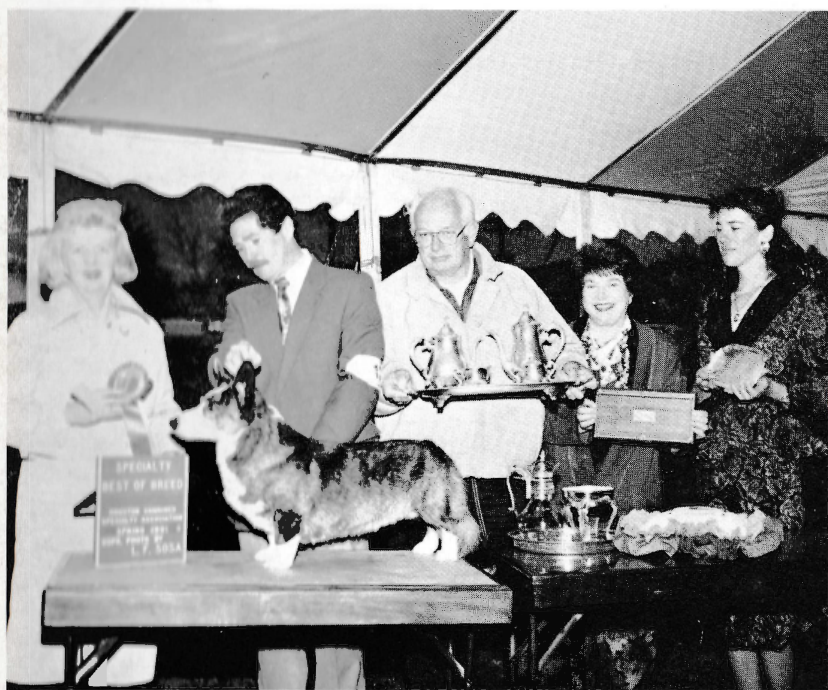

### Best in CWCCA National Specialty

From the beginning Bucky was a standout. Born in a litter of nine dark colored puppies, his mahogany red coat was truly captivating. At eight weeks his tremendous reach and drive were already evident. These qualities, coupled with his charming, humorous personality, were the deciding factors in keeping him. Bucky's presence in the ring has been so far unsurpassed. His influence as a sire is just beginning with his first progeny being shown in late 1988. Bucky sired the 1990 BOW and the 1991 RWB at our National Specialities. He has sired and grandsired multiple group placing children, and has some exciting litters planned for 1991.

#### Career Highlights:

- First group placement at his third show (9 months).
- Prior to his campaign with Ron Buxton, he was BOB 80% of the time, and had a 65% BOB to group placement ratio with Kim.
- Bucky has appeared in only three specialties:
  - 1984 Winners Dog, CWCCSC
  - 1990 Award of Merit, National Specialty
  - 1991 Best in Specialty, National Specialty
- All breed Best in Show, 1990
- Over 60 group placements including 13 Group Firsts
- For 1990: 12 Group Firsts,  
7 Group Seconds,  
14 Group Thirds,  
21 Group Fourths.

## W. Edward McGough

Ed McGough died at home on March 13, 1991. He was a native of New Jersey and graduated from St. Peter's College in Jersey City in 1950. He became interested in Cardigans through his friendship with Hal Nelson (Springdale) while Ed attended the Georgetown University Medical School. Ed transferred to Duke, received his medical degree in 1956, and joined the faculty of the Duke Medical School. He got his first Cardigan from Hal late in 1961. She was Springdale Brangwyn out of Ch. Springdale Arabella by Ch. Swansea Punch. Ed showed her to her championship in 1965 and to her CD in 1969.

During the late 1960's, Ed was active in the CWCCA. He served as First Vice President in 1966 and 1967 and as acting President for a few months in 1967. He also joined the faculty of the Rutgers Medical School at about the same time, and eventually rose to be the Dean of the Department of Psychiatry.

When Ed bred his first puppies in 1965, out of Springdale India, he took his kennel name, Hillsborough, from a suburb of Durham, North Carolina. Over the next 15 years or so, Ed got several more Cardigans from Hal, other American breeders, and he imported two English dogs, Ch. Hannaford Dilwel Trumpet and Ch. Dilwel Maggie. The results were these champions that he bred — Ch. Hillsborough Brother Puck, Ch. Hillsborough Dig Down, Ch. Hillsborough Kelly, Ch. Hillsborough Diamond, Ch. Hillsborough Other Love, Ch. Hillsborough Wellington, Ch. Hillsborough Krystal, Ch. Hillsborough Let's Pretend, Ch. Hillsborough Lucky Dove, Ch. Hillsborough Mrs. Mop, and Ch. Hillsborough Michie.

Ed owned Ch. Phi's Gabby, his last Cardigan, and several Springdale champions, the most notable of which was Ch. Springdale Droednoeth.

Every now and then in any breed, a dog comes along who just by his presence changes the course of a breed and propels it forward. Droed was such a dog. Ed showed him to his championship in 1964 and a few years later hired Peter Green to campaign him. That inspired duo won the 1969 National Specialty under Denis Grivas and went on to a Working Group 3 under the same judge. Over the next few years, Droed and Peter set a new standard for Cardigans in Working Group wins and placements until Droed's retirement with a National Specialty win in 1973, but the best year was 1972.

The Specialty! The '72 Specialty was at the Rubber City Kennel Club show on June 11. Droed was 9 years old. It was a record entry of 123, almost double the '71 Specialty. The judge was Joe Parkinson, proprietor with his wife, Agnes, of the English Parmel kennel. Droed won the breed. The

Working Group had to wait for him, and he won the Group under Henry Stoecker. Never had so many Cardigan enthusiasts stayed for Best in Show. Daylight was fading as judge Joe Tacker pointed to Droed, the first ever in the world Best in Show Cardigan!

In 1972, Ed also obtained his AKC judging license. He judged the Birmingham National in England that year. He judged the CWCCA Sweepstakes in 1976. He gave Best in Sweeps to Twinroc Eastwyn Joy and BOS to Rollingwood Gee Whiz. He judged the classes at the 1980 CWCCA Specialty and gave the breed to Ch. Eastwyn Miss Friendly and BOS to Ch. Rollingwood Gee Whiz.

After Droed's retirement, Ed turned more to his judging and added many more breeds and three groups. He moved to Colt's Neck, New Jersey, and joined the Monmouth Kennel Club of which he was President for many years. He was the AKC Delegate for the Rock River Valley Kennel Club and became an internationally popular and beloved figure in dogs. He never forgot Cardigans and always had them as his house dogs. He served on the CWCCA Board again in 1984 and '85.

Ed was a wonderful man. We in Cardigans were privileged to have known him and lucky that he chose our breed. He was 62. May he rest in peace. \*

## Gaines Medal Awarded to Ed McGough

The Cardigan Welsh Corgi Club of America recognized Dr. W. Edward McGough's many years of service to the breed by awarding him the Gaines Medal for Good Sportsmanship in 1990. Dr. McGough was a staunch and devoted supporter of the Cardigan Welsh Corgi for many years. He selflessly served the breed in a variety of capacities. As an exhibitor, breeder, Board member, judge and Delegate, he consistently demonstrated the highest standards of good sportsmanship. As an exhibitor and breeder he always strived to show and breed the best possible Cardigans. By owning and selectively showing the first Cardigan to go Best in Show, he helped immeasurably to promote the breed. When judging, at home or abroad, he was noted for his courtesy and encouragement to all exhibitors. While serving as a member of the Board, his skills as a facilitator greatly enhanced the effectiveness of the Board. As one of the senior representatives of the breed who continually worked for the benefit of the breed, he was most deserving of special recognition. \*

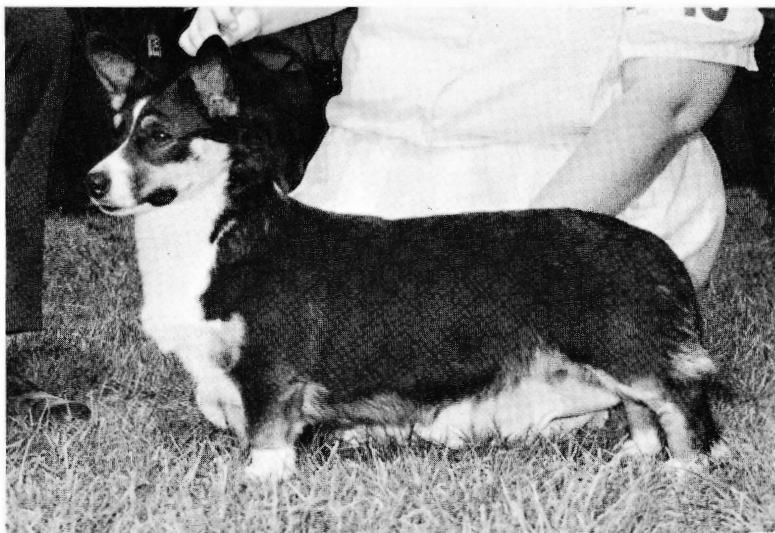

## Here Comes the Judge...

# Stephanie Hedgepath

Stephanie Hedgepath (Jimanie Kennels) began with German Shepherds over 22 years ago. She has bred German Shepherds, Pointers, Miniature Schnauzers, and both Corgis. She has bred over 20 Champions in Pointers, Pems and Cardis, as well as finishing others. Currently she judges German Shepherds, both Corgis, Collies, Shelties, Beardies and Junior Showmanship.

Her most important show dogs were Ch. Caralon's Chelsey of Horoko and Ch. Jimanie Barden Billy's Boy CD, both Pems, though she credits her original German Shepherd with teaching her a great deal about dogs, dog shows and fun. Her favorite Cardis include Ch. Rollingwood's Gee Whiz, Ch. Kennebec Ice Anchor and her current import, Gorthleck Blackthorn, a true Cardigan clown.

When judging Cardis, Stephanie looks for correct "outline first — (proportion of height to body length (is) most important!" A good headpiece with the "proper large ears properly set on... and the correct 3 to 5 proportions," coupled with the unique Cardigan front, all combine to give true Cardi type. Showing her German Shepherd background, Stephanie emphasizes side gait. "I want ground-covering action and dislike a dog that takes a lot of steps. I do not like a dog and handler that 'runs-very-fast' to make it look as if the animal is covering a lot of ground and outdistancing his competition... Ease of motion is very important." She feels that temperament "is of paramount importance. Without a good temperament a dog is not a good pet, much less a show specimen! ... I will not tolerate a shy dog, no matter what his good qualities may be." She puts temperament at the top of her list of priorities, followed closely by proper outline and head, and side gait.

Stephanie feels that Cardis have improved over the past few years, especially in heads, bone and movement. She is very pleased with the breed type of modern Cardis, though she warns us that we need to be careful of straight stifles and short upper arms, resulting in incorrect movement.

Her funniest moment with Cardis was when her husband finally realized that the new Corgi from England had come equipped with a full tail! \*

# Genetics Research Update

## Uneven Inheritance

Recent research with humans and mice may have implications for dog breeders. While not yet well understood by scientists, there is a phenomenon called "uniparental disomy" where an individual inherits double doses of some genes from one parent with no equivalent genes from the other.

We all have chromosome pairs (for humans 23, dogs 39) containing our genes, usually one chromosome from our mother and one from our father within each pair. Cell division occurs as chromosome pairs separate and go toward opposite sides of a dividing cell to become part of a sperm cell or egg. It is possible that occasionally an error occurs as a pair separates improperly, so that a given egg or sperm might contain 2 copies of a particular chromosome.

This particular sperm cell or egg could then unite with the corresponding egg or sperm cell such that three chromosomes are present creating a "triploid", such as in Down's Syndrome. If, however, one of the chromosomes from the other egg or sperm cell didn't integrate at fertilization, then a chromosome pair with both chromosomes from one parent could be created.

Some scientists suspect this phenomenon is not rare. There are also geneticists who have found that certain otherwise identical genes show differences depending on the sex of the contributing parent (more complications!) which might leave subtle abnormal traits in the individual with parental disomy.

Whatever the mechanism or the frequency of occurrence, if this phenomenon exists in dogs, there are implications for dog breeders. Uniparental disomy may explain some of the quirks and subtle abnormalities breeders have experienced, especially if old genetic rules seem to have been broken.

If it is possible for dogs to inherit normally recessive genes from one parent alone, it also becomes more difficult to state unequivocally that when a puppy shows a recessive trait, both parents must carry it. This is not, however, meant to offer a rationale to breeders who might want to blame other's dogs *whenever* nasty recessive traits such as PRA are found. After all, we will usually encounter standard sire/dam pairs.

Another implication, which should apply even without uniparental disomy, is that both parents of a planned litter should be of top quality. Of course, no sire or dam can correct every fault in the other, but if uniparental disomy exists in dogs and isn't rare, then that sire or dam may not even

Her litter with **Ch. Springshire's Jumping Jack** has produced 2 blue males, 1 blue female and 1 black female.

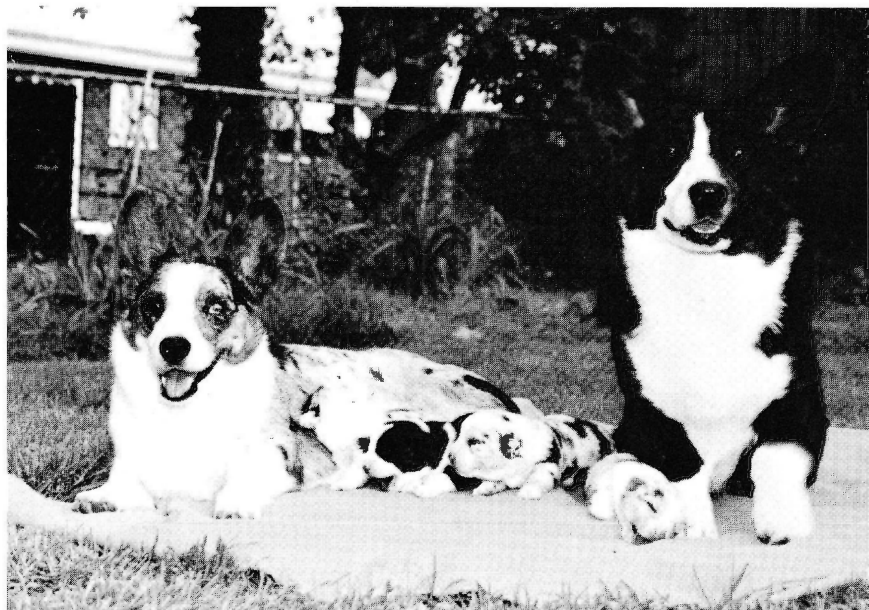

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# Conditioning Your Show Dog

by Jon Kimes

While the showing is the place to have future breeding stock evaluated, the condition and presentation of the exhibit can have a high impact on the success achieved. I will detail the conditioning I use for successful presentation in the hopes it will assist those who need direction.

Certainly the adage "You are what you eat" is very valid when discussing show conditioning. I feed my dogs a premium dry food moistened with warm water. With the high quality dog food, no meat or vitamin supplements are necessary. Also, it is very important to have clean, fresh water available to your dogs at all times. Routine worming is also essential, as worms can greatly affect both the body condition and the coat of the dog. I routinely worm all my dogs on a monthly basis.

For coat conditioning, I brush the coats of my show dogs every day, and begin this procedure at least two months before I plan to exhibit my dog. Place the dog on the grooming table (which you should have) and mist the coat all over with water. I then use a rubber based pin brush and brush the coat against the grain, and then with the grain. Be sure to brush the tail and the short leg hair as well. This daily brushing keeps the coat clean, stimulates the skin for healthy hair growth, and the water is the most superb coat conditioner.

Moving on to physical conditioning, I begin roadworking my dog at least two months before I intend to begin exhibiting him/her. Road working is not the horror story most of us suppose when we first hear the term. I simply trot the dog at a steady pace for approximately two miles three times a week. The constant trotting helps the dog develop a natural trotting style which enables him to move out with confidence and agility. The show ring pace is actually rather unnatural for most dogs, and without extended periods of time where the trot is practiced, the dog is less confident in this mode of travel. With the practice, the dog will tend to extend on the sidegait, which is what is desired. I do not road work to try to 'build' any sort of muscling - this business is done only to instill confidence and composure in the dog. I have found it especially helpful when exhibiting outdoors, as the roadworked dog will drive through the grass while the unconditioned dog will hop and bounce all over the place.

A week before the show, I give the dog a complete bath. Again, I use a high quality shampoo. For the white areas, I use a special shampoo for human hair, designed for white hair. This shampoo contains bluing, and one must be very careful to apply it to a wet coat and lather it well, or one will end up with a dog with blue feet. It is most successful to thoroughly rinse the coat with the grain, and a final rinse with an addition of white vinegar will cut any soap in the coat and add a high sheen. It is very important to carefully dry the dog with a hair dryer or you will end up with a clean, shapeless wonder with the inevitable

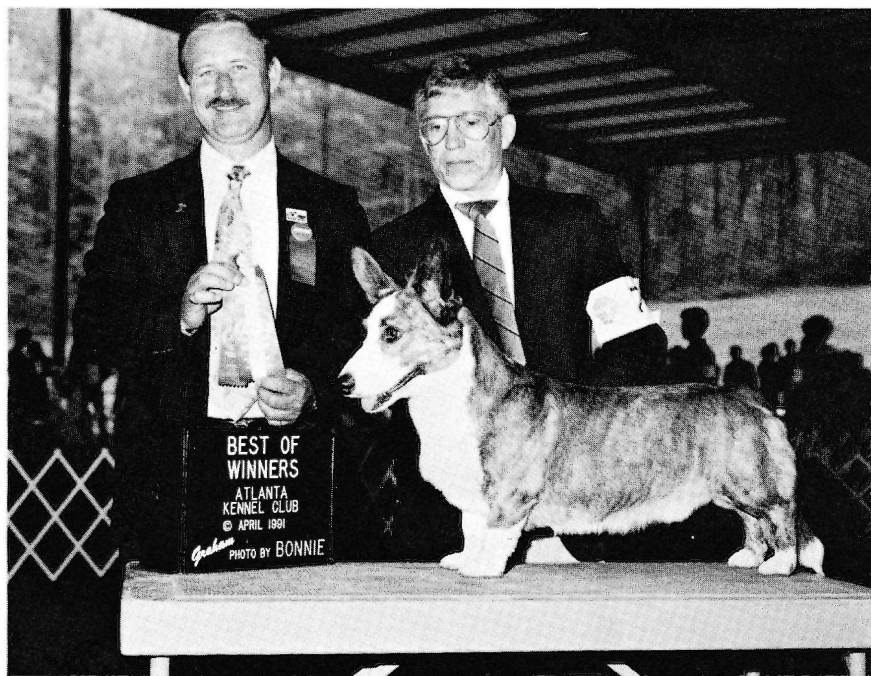
lumpy topline. A brush with bristles all around the center (i.e. a 'round brush') is excellent for smoothing the coat out flat. Do not stop drying the dog until you are absolutely certain the coat is dry right through the undercoat. A poorly dried coat will haunt you the next morning!

Nails must be trimmed with clippers or the nail grinder (which most dogs prefer). Use blunt tipped scissors to trim the long hairs on the underside of the foot. I very rarely trim whiskers anymore, as most judge's have accepted the fact dogs do have them, and also I am very lazy and do not do things which are unnecessary! Also express the anal glands. Please ask your vet to demonstrate this procedure - be sure to use the underside of your fingers for pressure and do not dig into the skin with your fingernails as it is easy to puncture the skin. Check the teeth for cleanness. A tooth scaler is inexpensive and very helpful if there is tartar on the teeth (judges really dislike dirty teeth). Also clean the ears with a little R7 ear cleaner on a cotton ball.

The night before the show, I again wash the white areas and use the hair dryer to puff the tail and pants. On show day, a little chalk can be applied to the face and feet, if necessary. Again mist through the coat and brush thoroughly, and your dog will have that wonderful 'professional' look which will greatly help him in the ring! \*

## Why a Judge's Critique?

by Patrick Ormos

"My Best of Breed won on her outstanding overall breed type and her exceptional shoulder assembly. The Best of Opposite Sex was equally good breed type, but slightly shorter in upper arm. Both moved extremely well."

This kind of a critique perhaps illustrates well some of the good points, and some of the imagined bad, of a judge's critique. Let me say from the outset that I am strongly in favor of a good judge's critique. In this article I will try to show why.

Clearly a Judge's Critique is only one person's opinion. That is its great strength. One critique will not make or break a dog. One critique will not brand a dog forever. One critique can not really influence the breed in any way. Some do not feel that one person's opinion is worth publishing, or that one person should have any influence over a breed, or that one person does not really know the breed. My response to these objections is simple: Why show your dog to that person if you refuse to honor that person's opinion?

Most other animals which are shown have a kind of critique. In some it is the judge, in some it is a qualified "grader", in some it is written, in some spoken . . . why is it that so many dog people want the critique to be silent? What are we afraid of?

Malcolm Willis has shown quite convincingly the value of a critique in his masterful book on German Shepherds. By studying years of critiques on the same dog, he has been able to form a good opinion of what that dog looked like, even if long dead. And that's the point—a critique is a bit of breed history. If thirty judges over eight years all agree that dog X has certain virtues and certain faults, then maybe he really does! Twenty years later I may be wondering where these characteristics come from. I discover that my pedigree is heavily line-bred on X, but I never saw him . . . what can I do? I can ask a long-time breeder about X, but after all that is only one person's opinion. Or, perhaps I can go back into the breed history and find several critiques of X by different judges . . . and maybe I'll learn something. A collection of critiques taken together is much more likely to give a somewhat objective view of dog X. Until we have an objective and permanent form of recording dogs, structure, motion, and type, then the judge's critique is the best thing we have.

In closing let me offer some thoughts about the way in which a judge should critique. I enjoy reading a critique in which the judge gives an opinion about breed type, structure, and movement on a particular animal—and gives me some indication of why he/she places the dog over others.

# Looking Back on the 1991 National Specialty

The 1991 National Specialty in Houston established precedents that will be remembered many years from now. Some say that it demonstrated the insight of the soothsayer's caution to Shakespeare's Julius Caesar, "Beware the ides of March." In deference to the CWCCA Board of Directors, the Specialty Chairman and host club show committee had scheduled the events to be outdoors on the grass. Six inches of rain and two days later, there was some feeling that the sheltering roof of the indoor arena did, in fact, offer some advantages!

Despite the vicissitudes of the weather, comments by many of the exhibitors indicated that this year's Specialty was one of the best ever. The Sweepstakes and Regular classes were held in adjoining rings, with Judge Betty Moore starting her work as soon as Connie Whan had completed judging Sweepstakes dogs entries, and then continuing concurrently. Hazel Arnold judged Junior Showmanship, while Harold Kohlman officiated in the obedience ring.

As anyone who has survived the experience of hosting a National Specialty can attest, everything depends on having a loyal core of dependable volunteers who are willing to spend many hours planning and executing a myriad of chores with imagination and initiative. We were especially fortunate this year in having several CWCCA members from far-flung states step in to help with the essential tasks, such as stewarding, that would have otherwise been beyond the capabilities of the little Bluebonnet club in Houston. The National Specialty is indeed a total CWCCA production of which we can all be proud. \*

# Did Noah Move to Texas?, or: *Impressions of the National Specialty by a First-Timer*

Alexander Dumas said it best in *A Tale of Two Cities*: "It was the best of times. It was the worst of times."

Except he wasn't talking about the weather. And he certainly wasn't referring to the 1991 Cardigan National Specialty!

Houston, Texas conjures up visions of cowboys, oil, and hot, steamy days punctuated by the occasional hurricane-born storms blowing in off the Gulf. This past March it conjured also an entry of 175 Cardigan Welsh Corgis, summoned to the most prestigious of all Cardi specialties. The local Bluebonnet Cardigan Welsh Corgi Club, small in core numbers but enormous in heart, undertook a daunting workload to present the premier event of the CWCCA's year.

For me, this year's trek to Houston was a first. Although I attended the National Specialty two years ago in California (beautiful, sunny California — yeah, right!), it was merely to watch a breeder-friend. As yet I was unCardified, boasting only a Lab bitch entered in the all-breed show the following day.

This time I went to the National properly prepared: I now owned my own Cardigan, and was prepared to step into the specials ring along with everyone else.

I just didn't expect to *slosh*.

Lab people — breed, obedience, or field trainers — are undismayed by rain. By their very natures, Labs are eminently suited to wet weather with a somewhat hard, double coat, and an exuberance undampened by — well, *damp*. Labs look good wet or dry; a wonderfully "honest" breed.

So are Cardigans honest and undaunted by rain. So do Cardigans look equally good wet; they too are doublecoated, and Wales is considerably more inhospitable, weatherwise, than practically every region in the United States.

But Labs have an advantage: legs. Real legs. Cardi legs are properly characterized as short. And while we all know short legs do not correlate with lesser abilities, they *do* occasionally cause one minor presentation problem.

When it rains as hard and fast as it did in Houston, puddles form. Puddles become ponds. Cardigan Welsh Corgis, understandably not desirous of drowning, will jump ponds; even those puddles merely suspected of harboring pond-sized aspirations.

It's hard to gait a Cardi when he/she is leaping puddles and ponds.

What began as an impressive display of nearly sixty Cardi champions

stacked nose-to-tail around a large double ring ended as a wet, miserable, shivering, odiferous mass of dogs and pitifully-clad humans huddled together under a leaking awning while lightning flashed and thunder rumbled . . . and one stout-hearted judge tried her best to find the driest spots available for her examination on the table, and paths of movement that did not harbor treacherous mud sinkholes and puddles that, in one case, sucked off an exhibitor's shoe.

Luckily, no dogs were lost. Though certainly a measure of decorum and dignity was.

For one brief shining moment (a tip of the hat to *Camelot*), I gazed around the big ring lined with eager Cardis and felt a pang of pride. Here I was with my young champion, ready to compete in our first National Specialty with all the Cardigan stars.

Then the rains came, and I and my young champion, like everyone else, discovered very quickly that no one looks much like a star, human or canine, in the midst of misery.

As the judge moved her table around, dodging waterfalls and tidal waves, waiting exhibitors also moved around, doing a delicate dance with ring ropes, tables, spectators. Some held dogs in their arms, some put dogs up on the stewards' table, some knelt in the "driest" spots and hugged young Cardis, murmuring reassurances. One exhibitor merely rolled up his pantlegs and carried on with aplomb, sartorial offense unremarked.

It might have been a travesty. Yet one thing became clear very quickly. Though all of us were wet and cold, no one took it badly. No one was angry. No one was annoyed. After all, *each* dog and handler was hampered by the conditions, regardless of experience and/or ranking.

In golf, they call it handicapping: an effort to equalize abilities so that everyone has a decent, fair chance to play the game.

In dog shows, they call it an Act of God. And they don't cancel the show because God is feeling capricious.

The travesty became triumph. The judge at last began to make her pulls. For the first time in my life, I witnessed exhibitors who failed to make the cut actually *relieved*. Those who made the cut, in view of the conditions, were pitied rather than envied.

In the end, as always, a single dog was anointed Best of Breed. In this case, the "anointing" was literal as well as figurative. God has a sense of humor.

Of course, God wasn't through with us yet. He appears to be an adherent of Instant Replay, because the next day we did it all again. Only this time the ring was half the size, the puddles and ponds were deeper, the sinkholes slimier. The responsibility of exhibitors to the fashion industry also fell by the wayside: winter parkas over summer dresses; sweat pants under skirts; grubby old shoes in place of new purchased just for the specialty. Yet again we slogged our way around the ring, forging rising rivers, and wished once more the judge would simply *point*, and get it over with.

Eventually, she did; the rest of us were mostly back at the hotel, taking solace in hot showers — or toddies.

God also has a superb sense of timing. After two days of pouring rain, exhibitors got the message. This time, people showed up boasting layers of water- and winterproof clothing, including kneehigh galoshes. This time, the ring was in the cow "barn." This time, we were *prepared*.

This time, the sun was shining. Steam began arising from the muffling layers of wool adorning overheated bodies. For the first time in three days, Cardi tongues dangled.

All in all, for me, the weekend was unprecedented. Dutifully I recorded my First Impressions of my First National Specialty on my laptop computer, jotting down notes like "Rain," "More rain," "Wind," "Fog," and "Sun?"

Added to these notes were additional impressions, such as drunk Russians in the elevator, marvelling (in Russian) over the half-blue/half-brown eye of my blue merle. "Different!" one exclaimed, pointing at Pilot's eyes.

Also the unconcealed amazement expressed repeatedly by badly outnumbered (!) Pembroke exhibitors at the hotel for a local specialty: "I've never seen so many Cardigans in my life!" and "I didn't know there were this many Cardigans in the whole *world!*"

And the disgust and astonishment on the faces of non-dog people, discovering themselves trapped in a hotel with an alien race of dwarf dogs they'd never heard of before, let alone ridden in an elevator jammed with them.

But also two other impressions that deserve mention here: the generosity of those exhibitors donating to and participating in the silent raffle; and, lastly, the courage and tremendous will-power of a woman so dedicated to serving her breed that she attended and worked every single event/meeting during the weekend despite undergoing two major operations within three weeks of the National Specialty.

Thank you, Liz Patterson. And thank you, Cardi people, for introducing me to a wonderful breed. ✱

make a contribution for a certain trait in an individual puppy! A given puppy might actually have more chromosomes from the lower quality parent.

With so much as yet unknown, it is pure speculation to find other implications; yet, they may become evident after future research. For example, the incidence of traits such as Down's Syndrome increases after age 35 in humans; do these other inheritance problems increase with age? Would that apply to dogs?

The fundamental result of all this research with human genetics is that inheritance, like any other qualities, does not quite always proceed according to plan. ✱

# CWCCSC Sweepstakes Critique

by Leah James

This was my first trip to California since the CWCCA Nationals two years ago. It gave me an opportunity to see youngsters who weren't even a glimmer in their breeder's eye. It delighted me to have an entry which was filled with depth of quality in each class. Rather than critique each individual, I'd like to comment on overall impressions.

*Temperament* — Excellent, with only a couple of exceptions. Most appeared to be well socialized and very happy, outgoing dogs. Even those who were a little unsteady seemed to simply need some socializing.

*Type* — Although several styles were apparent, there were none that totally resembled something other than a Cardigan. One of my personal pet peeves is "Pemmie" looking Cardigans, and I do not recall entries that I discounted for this reason. I must comment that there was a preponderance of puppies who seemed better than those I had observed two years ago.

*General movement* — This was the area which, to me, had greatly improved. Although some work still needs to be done, it has come a long way. I was impressed with overall improvement in both cleanness coming and going and better side-gait than usually seen. This was born out by improvement in both fronts and rears. If I were to find fault or criticize, it would be in toplines and side-gait. I am a believer in the adage that without a good back and topline you lose transmission from the rear to the front. Those exhibits which I penalized for their movement were, in my mind, pups who lacked strong tight backs and firm level toplines. Some of this can be developed with age and exercise, but not a lot. I would comment that some of the exhibits lacked both front and rear angulation. Straight stifles and fronts don't produce fluid, ground-covering side-gait. We don't want German Shepherds, but we do need to have the ability to cover ground with the least possible effort.

I believe that I should comment on the Best in Sweepstakes and Best of Opposite Sex in Sweep and several contenders who pressed the eventual winners.

Best in Sweepstakes went to the winner of the 6-9 month puppy bitch class. This young lady had it all together on this day. She had an impeccable topline, clean front and rear and fine side-gait. Her attitude was wonderful to watch. Beautiful type and temperament. If I were to criticize, I would have preferred a little more croup, as she has a tendency to fly her tail.

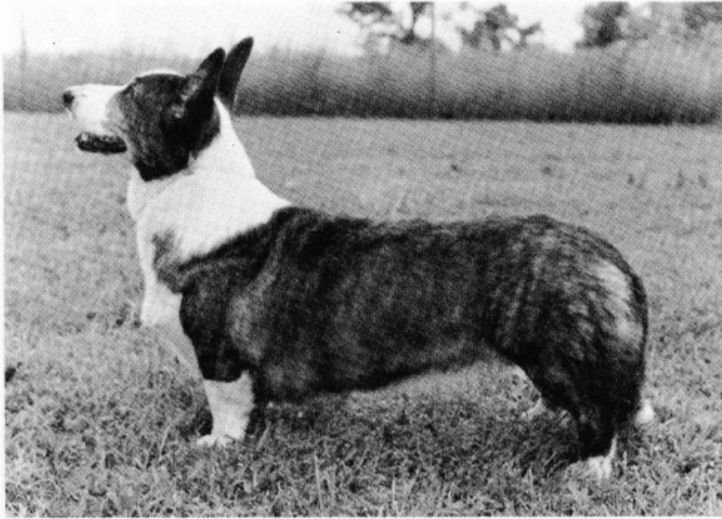
Best of Opposite Sex was from the 6-9 month puppy dog class. I found this lovely black and white male to be equally pleasing in movement and type. Although needing some ring experience, when he puts himself together he covers ground easily and is clean on both ends.

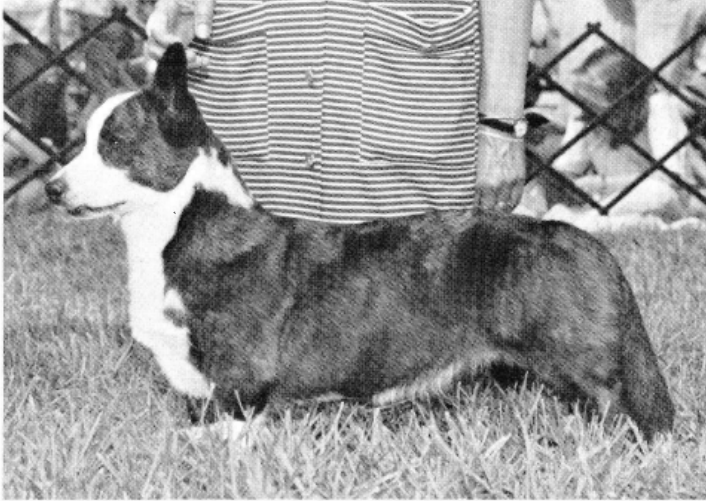

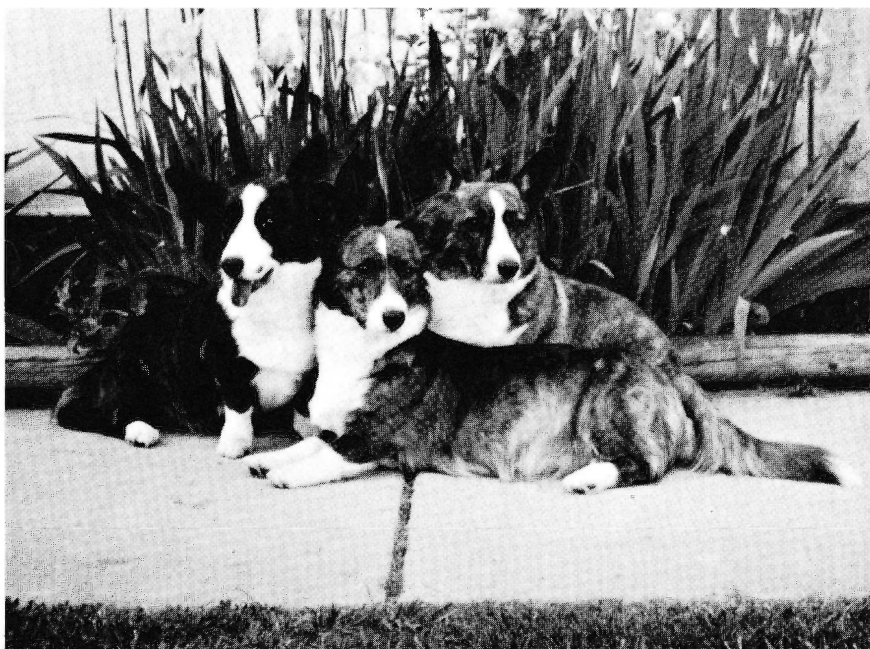

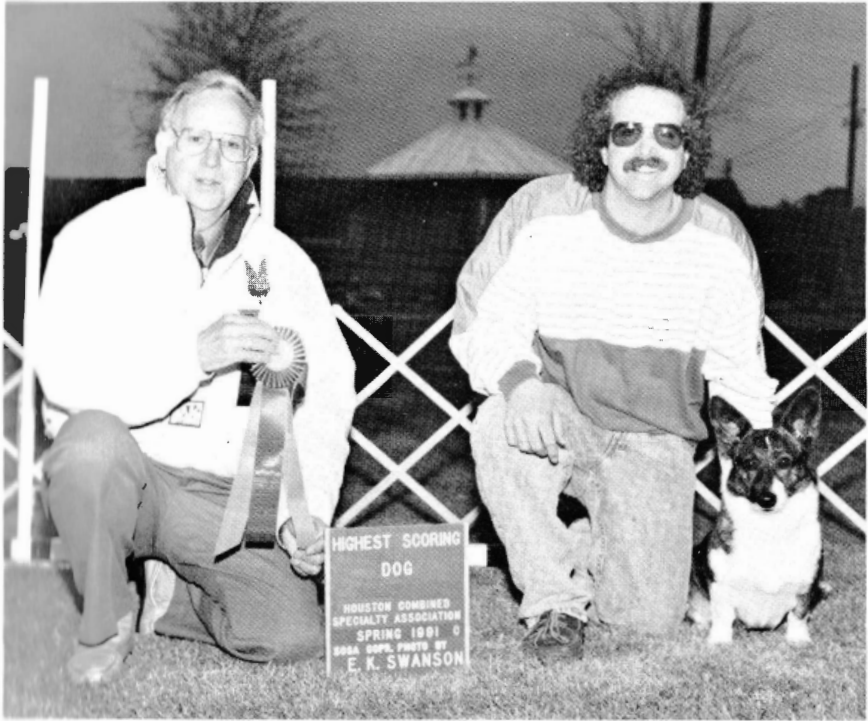
